Course Information

Brief Description of Course

University of Utah 1st and 2nd year medical students are invited to participate in a clinic experience at the Utah Diabetes and Endocrinology Center (615 Arapeen Dr # 100). Students will practice history-taking, performing physical examinations, documentation on EPIC and learn the management of chronic illnesses alongside Dr. Deepika Reddy and other endocrinology physicians. In addition to keeping up with recorded lecture material, students will work one 5-hour shift/month over the Spring (1/10/2022 –4/29/2022) or Fall (8/22/2022 –12/2/2022) semester.

Students will learn more about various topics in diabetes care including pharmacologic management, diabetes healthcare technology, nutrition and exercise counseling, and navigating patient insurance. A key element of the course is to understand the role of social determinants of health on the management of diabetes.

Course Objectives

As a result of successfully completing the Endocrinology Longitudinal Experience course, students will be able to:

- 1. Describe best practice guidelines for the treatment of diabetes and screening for complications.
- 2. Develop skills to assess and manage patients with chronic illnesses.
- 3. Assess and identify gaps in care and find ways to improve system of care to patients with diabetes.
- 4. Describe the role that social and structural determinants of health have in impacting diabetes care and adapt treatment plans to address patient needs.

Course Format & Schedule

Spring Semester 2022: January 10, 2022 – April 29, 2022, Fall Semester 2022: August 22, 2022 – December 2, 2022 Once/month clinic shifts of 5 hours duration each, Thursday 8:00am-noon or Friday 1:00pm-5:00pm (20hrs) 12 recorded lectures assigned, approximately 30-min each (6hrs) Total work: 26 hours minimum

Role of the Student in this Course

- 1. Clinical: Interview patient, perform physical exam, assess patient need and form treatment plan clinic visit documentation with attending physician support/review and follow up on clinical plan.
- 2. Recorded Lectures: View and write 1-page reflection on recorded lectures and clinical experience. Complete post lecture quiz with each recorded lecture.



3. Clinic quality improvement feedback: Complete anonymous course survey at start and end of course to help improve the clinical and didactic experience.

PASS: A student who achieves all of the criteria will be assigned a grade of PASS for the course. Detailed feedback on student performance will be given.

FAIL: A student who fails to achieve all of the criteria for PASS will be assigned a grade of FAIL for the course.

Criteria to Pass include: Completion of both pre and post-ELE surveys, completion of at least 11/12 lecture reflections, attendance and participation at 4 clinic experiences.
