Brief Description of Course

A 4th year pediatric inpatient and subspecialty elective at Utah Valley Regional Medical will provide students with experience in inpatient and subspecialty pediatrics in a regional medical center. Students will spend four weeks on the inpatient wards at UVRMC. Students will be an integral part of the team and function as interns. As such, they are fully responsible for patient care and evaluation, under direct supervision of the attending physician. This will give the student a unique and valuable opportunity to experience what various pediatric careers will be like on a day to day basis.

Course Goals

As a result of successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

1. Students will be able to gain supervised experience to the variety and complexity of pediatrics in both hospitalized and ambulatory patients in a real world setting;
2. Students will be able to further develop a knowledge base from patient care experiences, conferences, independent study, defined readings and didactic sessions that will enhance their ability to become an excellent intern;
3. Students will be able to experience firsthand the day to day "real world" of pediatric inpatient and subspecialty physicians;
4. Students will be able to engage with attending physicians in a valuable one-on-one learning environment

Course Format & Schedule

Timeline

This is a four week rotation, of which two weeks are inpatient pediatrics and two weeks are subspecialty clinics. These can be shuffled as needed for a best fit for students/clinicians.
