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Course Information

Brief Description of Course

An independent research course arranged between the individual student and the individual mentor. The intent of the course is to provide Phase III and IV students with experience in hypothesis driven research relevant to Surgery.

Course Goals

As a result of successfully completing the SURG 7280 Course, students will be able to:

- 1. Effectively discuss the scientific question addressed by the research.
- 2. Effectively discuss their contribution to addressing the scientific question.
- 3. Effectively discuss the resolution of the research.
- 4. Effectively discuss the research in the larger context of the practice of Surgery.

Role of the Student in this Course

Before registration, a brief (less than one page) research proposal stating the research goals, hypothesis(es) to be tested, data collection and analysis approach, and expected time frame should be submitted to the faculty instructor (by email) for approval. An email from the research mentor should be sent to the faculty instructor with assurances that the mentor approves of the research proposal and s/he understands the grading criterion.

Specific project goals and expectations should be arranged with the consent and input of the mentor. The proposed research should apply the scientific method and be hypothesis driven, with the expectation of a significant contribution by the student to a project suitable for co-authorship on an abstract at a national meeting or manuscript publication.

Upon approval by way of email from the faculty instructor, the student may use the approval email to register for the course at Student Affairs.
